

Stanislava KARDJIEV-Svirac - Violin

At the age of seven, she was already taking violin lessons.

Her first encounter with the violin left her with an impression as of love at first sight; her passion was so strong that she understood this immediately:

The violin and music would become her profession, vocation, and life.

She studied at the University of Music and Performing Arts in Vienna, and graduated with a master's degree.

Since her childhood, Stanislava has also won prizes at various national and international violin competitions, including the Richard Flury in Switzerland. During her studies she received a scholarship for exceptional artistic talent from the University of Music and Performing Arts in Vienna.

She received the most important musical impulses from her professor at the University of Music and Performing Arts in Vienna, Prof. Frischenschlager, as well as from master classes by world-famous violinists such as Tibor Varga, Vladimir Spivakov, Erich Gruenberg, and Vladimir Wladigeroff.

Stanislava Kardjiev is a versatile violinist. Her repertoire includes baroque, Viennese classical, romantic, 20th century, and contemporary music. She is also particularly fond of playing the violin concerto by Alban Berg and other works of the Second Viennese School, including on concert tours in Spain, appearing as soloist on Alban Berg's violin concerto in many cities, including Madrid at the Centro de Arte Reina Sofia, and further appearances in Italy: Milano, Padua, Rovigo, and Cremona with works from the Second Viennese School and the Czech Republic: performance of works by contemporary Austrian composers at the Forfest Music Festival in Kromeriz.

She has played several recital evenings at the Vienna Society for Music Theater.

She has played orchestral concerts under the baton of world-famous conductors such as Riccardo Muti, Mstislav Rostropovich, Dmitry Sitkowitzki, Heinz Wallberg, and Heinrich Schiff.
